CONCEPT

Northeast India has adopted perspectives that have allowed itself to explore objects, culturally specific concepts, and actions as interacting with changing contexts, it becomes clear that such interactions can cause structural formations to shift in a variety of ways. But to contemplate the shaping and reshaping of meaning from a scientific distance is not to obscure the fact that the meanings transmitted by members of cultural communities are a product of how they have interacted within and outside. This conference therefore, to be seen as an attempt to engage with interactions, and how these interactions have engendered new meanings that have transformed and integrated into the already existing multi layered cultural and social structures.
